## Soldier's Application for Pension

I, ..... Samuel D. Everett .....

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at ... Pryse ..... in the County of ... Estill .....

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of ... Kentucky ....., in the war between  
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of ... Company "H", Fourth Kentucky Infantry .....

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-  
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer ..... Montgomery County, Kentucky .....

**To Applicants for Pension**

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 22nd inst.

The pension law of Kentucky provides that if a pensioner shall be absent from the State for a period of three months his name shall be dropped from the pension roll, and our records show that Samuel D. Everett has been absent from the State for a period of a considerable length of time over that, and it will be necessary ~~to drop his name from the pension roll of Kentucky~~ for his name to be dropped from the pension roll at the end of the present quarter, which is November 1st, 1917.

Dear Sir:-

The Kentucky pension law provides that when a pensioner has been absent from the State of Kentucky for a period of three months the name shall be dropped from the pension roll, and our records show that you have now been absent from the State for a longer period than that, and in order that the law be complied with it will be necessary for your name to be dropped from the roll at the end of the present quarter, which is November 1st, 1917.
