Soldier's Application for Pension

I, T.J. Sublett
 am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Bowling Green in the County of Warren
 in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Mississippi in the war between
 the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
 Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
 that I was a member of McNair Rifles of Summitt Mississippi and afterwards called Summitt...
 Rifles., being a part of 3rd Mississippi Battalion
 in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
 benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
 and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
 ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Warren County Ky. April 7th 1835.....

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer Enlisted in Aug. 1861, Summit Rifles and after Battle at Shiloh,
 joined or was consolidated with Cleburns Division, Hardee's Corps

 Hardcastle Colonel, 45th Miss. Reg.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer When Gen. Lee surrendered I went to New Orleans, met Gen. S.R. Buckner and he went with me to Gen. Penepacker and took Oath.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer No.....

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer I don't know what Gen Buckner did or said in his
 conference with Gen Penapacker (Federal General) but I was given
 some kind of papers which permitted me and my comrades to go
 home. This was done at St. Charles Hotel at New Orleans Apr 1865.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes, as stated above, I suppose the papers given us by Gen Pena-
 packer was the Oath of Allegiance.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer Because Gen Lee had surrendered and the war was over.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer None

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer None.

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer House & lot worth \$1200.00 Household furniture worth not exceeding \$150.00

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer Nothing, from June 1913 to date

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer Not at all.

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer All my life except one year just before the war

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer Chas Drake, Bowling Green KY.

Has Cataract in eyes. Right eye totally blind and left so crippled that it is of little service to him. Can see enough to find his way but cannot do any manual labor. Also suffers with Rheumatism in right arm.

And V.M. Cox & Milt Taylor further make oath to the following facts touching the applicant's service in the Confederate army.

State here what witnesses know of their own knowledge.

The affiant V.M. Cox says that he is 65 years old and has known the applicant T.J. Sublett all his life. Is a justice of the Peace of Warren County. I know that it was reported that he joined the Confederate Army in the first year of the war in Mississippi & his family was then living near my home in said county. When said Sublett came to Ky with his Mississippi Regiment Gen. Buckner had headquarters at Bowling Green Ky. When Gen. Buckner left Bowling Green going South said Sublett left with his command and I saw him no more till the war closed, when he came home and has been a good law abiding citizen. Affiant Milton Taylor says he knows that said Sublett was a Soldier in the Confederate Army and belonged to a Mississippi Reg in 1861 (think the 45th Reg) I saw him in Sept 1861 at Bowling Green Ky. when Gen. Buckner was stationed there and when Buckner left in 1862 Sublett also left with him. Next saw him after Shiloh Battle at Corinth Miss then saw him after Peryville Battle and again just before the Battle at Mission Ridge about Nov 1863. I saw no more of him till I came home in latter part of May 1865.

- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.

- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.

The records show that T. J. Sublett, private, Captain McNair's Company Mississippi Volunteers (also subsequently known at different times as Co. E, 33d Mississippi Volunteers, Co. E, 45th Mississippi Infantry, and as Co. E, 3d Battalion Mississippi Infantry), C.S.A., enlisted Nov. 11, 1861. On the roll of Co. E, 45th Mississippi Infantry, C. S. A., dated April 30, 1864, he was reported "Transfd. Promoted to 1" Lt. in Col. Lay's Cav. Com'd. Apr. 24, 64." He was also reported discharged by Special Orders of the C. S. War Department Aug. 6, 1864, he having been elected a commissioned officer. No later record of him has been found.

The name T. J. Sublett has not been found on the rolls, on file in this office, of any company of the 20th (Lay's) Confederate Cavalry, C. S. A.

The affiant, P.W Shearer, states that he is 79 years of age and resides at Greenwood in the State of Mississippi. That he was a Confederate soldier in the late war between the States and was a member of CO. K, 45th Reg. Miss Vol. Inf'try, Hard Castle Col, ~~Thompson~~ <sup>Wolfe</sup> Capt. Was appointed Quarter Master of said Reg. and know of my own personal knowledge, that in the summer of 1862, the above named applicant, T.J. Sublett, was a confederate soldier and a member of CO. E in said 45th Reg. <sup>Capt Thompson</sup> and affiant appointed him wagon master of said Reg. that during the Campaign in Ky. and about the time of the Battle at Perryville, said Sublett was dangerously sick with Flux near Harrodsburgh in a private house and our army being compelled to evacuate Ky. made forced marches, and it being apparent that said Sublett was not able to move with the army and if left behind, would be captured and imprisoned and there being no time to secure Furlough from headquarters for him and after consulting with Lieut. Col Rich Charlton (Col Harcastle having been disabled) said Charlton and this affiant advised said Sublett and permitted him, if possible, to make his way through the Federal lines to his home in Southwestern Ky. and after recuperating to rejoin us. AT this <sup>time</sup> the Federals occupied Bowling Green and so continued till close of the war. Notwithstanding these difficulties, said Sublett did make h <sup>through</sup> his way the Federal lines and in a short time rejoined his old command and this affiant appointed him as Wagon Master in Gen M.P. Lowery's Brigade about the time of the Battle of Chicamauga (affiant having been appointed Quarter Master in said Brigade) and as affiant remembers said Sublett remained with said brigade until the early days of 1865 when he was transferred to a new cavalry command operating in Southern Miss. and was made Lieut of said command and so ~~remained~~ <sup>remained</sup> till ~~Lee's~~ <sup>Lee's</sup> surrender and his command was disbanded. Affiant further states that said Sublett made a good soldier and officer
