- Note—1. Before any questions are answered the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.



Testimony of E. W. Branble, Maysville, R. R. #3.

Have known the applicant about three years, don't know
just how long, she has been a resident of Kentucky. Was acquaint-
ed with her husband James A. Long, I have no actual knowledge
of when he enlisted, but see from his duplicate application
that he enlisted August, 9th, 1862, Second Mississippi, Battall-
ion. Company D. Confederate States Army. I was not in the War.
I see from his application that he performed duty until the
close of the War, and surrendered at Apperमतox Courthouse,
April, 9th, 1865. Mrs. Long, has never re-married since her
husbands death. She has no property and she had none since I
have known her. She is not able to earn a support by manual
labor, nor has she any knowledge, art or skill in any profess-
ion trade or craft.

The application of Caroline F. Long, for a pension under the provision of the Act of 1914, providing pensions for Confederate Soldiers or their widow's having been filed in this Court at a previous regular term thereof, and having laid over until the present term, said application being in duplicate, under oath, properly attested by two reputable witnesses as to the identity of the applicant, and same being taken up at this regular term, the County Attorney being present, representing the Commonwealth, the testimony being heard in open Court, as to the applicants citizenship, residence and means of support.

It is now found that said Caroline F. Long, is the widow of James^A Long, who died February, 9th, 1916, at Orangesburg, M Mason County, Kentucky, being at the time of his death a pensioner of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, under the Confederate pension Act, as evidenced by Pension certificate No., 1416; That she was married on February, 8th, 1877, and was living with said James A. Long, as his lawful wife at the time of his death. that she is now and has been all her life a resident of Ky.,

It is found that said James A. Long, was born in Yiaolabus-ha, County, Mississippi, April, 8th, 1841, and being an actual bonifida resident of Kentucky, continuously since the war; that he did actual military service in the confederate Army from the date of his enlistment August, 9th, 1861, until the close of the War; That said Caroline F. Long, has no property except

one horse and household goods valued at \$200.00, and is not able to earn a support by manual labor or by reason of the knowledge or skill or any profession, trade or craft, that she does not receive any pension from the United States, or any State or Foreign Government, that her support is not provided for by reason of any contract or agreement by the persons able to provide such support.

It is recommended that this pension be allowed.
