herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) Emily Francis Moudy P.O. Hickory, R.F.D. No. 1 Graves County Kentucky.
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? 5 1/2 years - since 1866
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? I was born in Robertson County Tennessee October 20th 1852 Emily F Jones was my name.
4. When and where was your husband born? State his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony? (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) in 1828 in Robertson County Tenn. his name was George Washington Moudy. Married in Graves County Ky. in 1868. Dec 24. Eld. Bob Mahan married us our Court house burned records destroyed
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment, did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? I dont know. his application for pension will show this
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? I dont know
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? I dont know
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company Regiment surrendered? I dont know
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? I dont know, of my own knowledge
10. When and where did your husband die? my husband died George W Moudy, Oct 7th 1916 in Graves Co Ky. near Potosi
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes Sir.
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No Sir.
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? I own 23 acres of land and about \$600⁰⁰ worth of personal property. The land is worth about \$1000⁰⁰, no income.
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? I have no family. children all married.
15. Name some friend, giving his name and postoffice address, who will be willing to have us write to him about your case if necessary. A. W. Nicholson. Hickory Ky. R.F.D. No. 1

Questions for Witnesses

of said State and County, having been presented as a witness in support of the application of Mrs. Mrs. Emma Francis Maudy for a pension under Confederate Pension Law, approved March 11, 1912, after being duly sworn, true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? D. W. Nicholson, Hickory Ky, No. 1. R.T.D.
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Emma F Maudy
If so, how long have you known her? I have known her since 1866.
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? near Pottsville Kentucky. she has been a resident since 1866.
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? Yes Sir.
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? I, D. W. Nicholson, was not, but I know they lived together as man and wife intil he died.
6. How long did you know him? I knew him from time of their marriage to his death.
7. When and where did George W Maudy enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? I dont know.
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? I was not.
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? I dont know.
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? I dont know.
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? No Sir.
12. Was George W Maudy, the husband of applicant, present?
I dont know.
13. If not present, where was he? ~~~~~
14. When and where did he leave his command?
For what cause? ~~~~~
By whose authority did he leave? ~~~~~
- How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) from having lived within a mile of him all the time - I mention.
15. When and where did George W Maudy die? October 7th 1916. at his home in Pottsville Ky.
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? he resided at Pottsville Kentucky. had lived in there or near there since 1865.
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of George W Maudy you know they lived as man and wife from time of marriage to his death

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow?

She has, and is now his widow

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge? *She owns 23 acres of land. and some personal property, I don't know how much, the land is not worth over \$1200.00 in my opinion.*

Has applicant conveyed any property, in the last two years or given any away, if so, what was it, and to whom?

If she has disposed of any of her property, I don't know it, except to divide some of her house-hold effects among her 3 children.

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

In the matter of application for pension of Mrs Emily Francis Moudy, whose post office address is Hickory, Kentucky, R F D No 1.

the court makes the following report of findings, Viz:

That the applicant is the widow of George Washington Moudy who was a confederate soldier, and at the time of his death October 7th 1916, that the value of her property will not exceed \$1600. she has no income and does not now and has never received a pension from any State nor Government.

Then came Joe W Glisson and W P Ray two competent witnesses whose post office address is Hickory, Kentucky who after having been duly sworn testified that they know the applicant herein to be the lawful widow of George Washington Moudy and that they married prior to 1890, and that she has about 23 acres of land worth about \$1000. and personal property to the amount of about \$600. and that she has no other property, nor income.

Wherefore in view of the foregoing facts it is the judgment of the court that said applicant should be granted a pension and the court so recommends.
