Soldier's Application for Pension

I, N. T. Hood

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Little Muddy in the County of Benton

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Co B 6th Regt Texas Cav

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Benton Mo 19, December 3rd 1836

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer Enlisted in Aug 1861, Co A 1st Regt, Capt Dye, Commanded by McCulloch, think his name was Benjamin

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Paroled at Canton Miss at close of war - can't give date

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer No

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes, at Canton Miss, at close of war - can't give date

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer No, was given a small piece of paper, can't recall

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer *No business*

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *Real estate worth about \$1200. The law is out of repair and being put in repair, two head of horns of two cows worth about \$200. This is all the property I have*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *My wife is dead and left no estate*

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer *No income except about 15¢ realized as rent off of that part of farm rented. I am not able to do any work at all.*

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer *Not here*

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer *Since 1865 I have lived in Kentucky*

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer *Yes*

If so, give his name and address?

Answer *Att. Gen. Morgan*



- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Upon application for Confederate Pension.

Upon motion of A.H.Tuck. and W.A.Helm.Attys. for N.T.Hood.it is ordered that the above application be and the same is heard by re-instated upon the docket of this court for proof as to the property owned by said Hood.it also appears that this application for confederate pension was duly filed at the regular term of the court July 1st. 1912, and continued to the regular term of the court August 5th, 1912, at said term proof was heard and a finding, of the facts was made by G.V.WILLIS. the County Judge of Butler Co, Ky. and mailed to Confederate pension Commissioner at Frankfort, Ky. but as further proof is ordered for said Applicant. and for that purpose comes R.M.Sharer. and Ben.C.Johnson. two neighbors of said applicant and after first being duly sworn states as follows: they say said applicant is eighty two (82) years old and has a crpple leg and is unable to do any kind of manual labor that applicant owns about 150 acers of land worth about \$1000.00 that said farm has been rented for sevelely years and is very mutch out of repair and that said applicant does not live on said farm and does not realize exceeding \$50.00 per year rent on said farm. that he has no personal property of any kind that tis applicant lives with his daughter who waits upon him.

the above witnesses were examined by said A.H.Tuck and W.A.Helm.

Attys for said Hood. and W.M.Blain.Co. Atty of Butler Co being present but made no objection and offered no proof but the court finds at the time the proof was at the Aug, term 1912, the applicant had Two horses and two cows valued at \$200.00 but at the hearing on this day it appears that the applicant has no personal property at all.

therefore the court can see no reason for making objection to the allowance of this claim that it would be a just payment to an old and cripple confederate soldier. it is true that applicant has no affidavits of comrades who served with him in said Co "B" 6th. Texas Cavalry. on file in his claim in this court. but his Attys, say that such affidavits were procured and are now on file in Frankfort.

As you saw from the reply of the Adjutant General to the Hon. Robert Y. Thomas, the records show that N. T. Hood enlisted Sept. 9, 1861, in the 6th Texas Cavalry, and that there is record proof of service to June 30, 1864, and no later record of him was found.

The law requires that a soldier shall have served from the time he enlisted until the close of the war, or until he was honorably discharged.

The proof lacking in this case is to show any service Mr. Hood rendered after June 30, 1864, and when and how he got out of the army. He furnished no proof by comrades or otherwise as to his military record.

The additional proof indicated above would ofcourse have to be made by his comrades.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 23rd inst. relative to the application of N. T. Hood.

The war records show that he enlisted Sept. 9, 1861, in Co. B, 6th Texas Cavalry, and was present with his company June 30th, 1864, and no later record of him has been found. Consequently, the proof necessary to bring him within the provisions of the law is to show any service he rendered after ~~May 30~~, June 30, 1864, and when and how he got out of the army.

The law requires that a soldier shall have served from the date of his enlistment till the close of the war or until he was honorably discharged. There being no record proof of Mr. Hood's service after June 30, 1864, the proof would have to be made by men who served with him and know the facts in the case and themselves made honorable records. Practically this same information was given to A. H. Kirk of Morgantown, Ky. June 29, 1916, and since that no additional proof has been filed.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 21st inst. relative to the application for pension of Newell T. Hood. The trouble with Mr. Hood's application is that there is no proof to show any service he rendered after June 30, 1864. There is record proof of service to this date. The law requires that a soldier shall have served from the date of his enlistment till the close of the war or until he was honorably discharged. It is necessary that proof be produced to show that he comes within this provision of the law before a pension can be allowed him, and that proof would have to be made by men who served with him and know the facts in the case and themselves made honorable records.

Practically this same information was given to A. H. Turk, Morgantown, Ky. June 29, 1916, and to R. S. Reeves, Morgantown, Ky. October 26, 1916, and no additional proof has been filed.

In the matter of the application for pension of N . T. Hood, under the laws of the State of Kentucky; I State that I knew Mr . N . T. Hood well, that he was called "Dock Hood" in the Army,, and that he enlisted in Company B, of the 6th Texas Cavalry, and was sworn into the service at Camp Bartow, in Dallas County, Texas, on the 9th day of September, 1861,, and he was in said Company until 1864, in the State of Mississippe, when I was appointed Ordinance Sarrgant, and was tranferred to the Trans-Mississippe Department, and was not with that Company any longer .. I have recently had a talk with Mr . Miles L . Williams, of Synder, Texas, who was also a member of the said Company, and he told me that he and Hood remained in the Company until the close of the War, when they were parolled, and Hood went to Kentucky, and Williams came back to Texas .

Before me, the undersigned authority, on this day personally appeared M. L. Williams, known to me to be a credible person, who being by me duly sworn upon oath did depose and say, that on Sept. 9th. 1861, he, together with N. T. (Newell or Dock) Hood and W. B. Wade went from Rockwall county, Texas, to Camp Barto, Dallas County, Texas, and were mustered into the service of the Confederacy and placed in Company B, 6th. Texas, Cavalry, Captain Summers Griffith in charge of Company B, B. Warren Stone Regiment.

Sometime before the war ended W. B. Wade was transferred back home but Dock Hood and myself remained with the Company during the entire war.

N. T. Hood (who we called Dock and whose given name was Newell) remained through the entire war and was never discharged nor did he desert and a truerer and braver soldier never bore arms during the four years of the war. We were together during the Hood raid into Nashville, Tenn., and when we fell back we came back to Mississippi, half of the Regiment received furloughs to go home, I got a furlough and came home, Dock Hood did not receive a furlough but remained with the regiment and while I was at home on furlough the war ended and those who were in camp in Mississippi were disbanded.

We were just camped in the woods in Mississippi and I do not know the name of the camp, he did not come back to Texas but went to Kentucky, Bowling Green was his home and he went there after the war.

I do not know the exact spot where the camp was located in Mississippi nor do I know the exact date they were disbanded but it was sometime in the spring of 1865. Colonel Pete Ross was our Colonel and he came back to Texas with us on a furlough, we were to meet him in Marshall, Texas, after our furlough was up, we went back to Marshall to meet him and when we got there we, who had been home on a furlough, were disbanded.
