Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Frank Boygo

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Nella vale in the County of Greenup

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Virginia, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company H 4th Va. Inf.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Price County Va, in year of 1843

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer In June or July 1862 in command of Genl. Buenaes. Col. Camp. Slump Major Joe Richmond. Lieut. Col. Prudenmore. Capt. McCallum 1st Lieut John Hanterson 2nd Lieut J. W. Mills

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Paroled for exchange from Camp Douglas Ill. prison about April 1865 you sent to Richmond Va for exchange but when I got there was not exchanged for confed. army surrendered in a few days after my arrival.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.
Answer Yes. Camp Douglas Ill. prison in spring of 1865 paroled at Richmond Va for exchange as stated above.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?
Answer Yes, as stated above at Camp Douglas Ill and sent to Richmond Va for exchange.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer No.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer Did not take it.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer Farming and minister of Gospel. Do not earn more than \$100 per year.

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer 37 acre farm worth about \$500 personal property \$150

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer None at all.

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer Will not exceed \$150 per year.

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer No

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer Continuously since 1869.

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer No but W. H. Allen is my agent.

If so, give his name and address?







- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.


In the matter of application for pension of Frank Boggs.

Is able to labor some for his support.



Mr. Boggs can earn something by labor, possibly 60¢/per day, his wife has no property.

Bryant Fannin, of Stoneington, Greenup County, Kentucky, being first duly sworn testifies Have known Mr. Boggs six or seven years He has been a resident of Kentucky, since Jan. 1st, 1907. Do not know value of his prop rty his income would not exceed \$300.00 per year.
