## Soldier's Application for Pension

I, James Deal

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Middleboro in the County of Bell

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company "A" - 8<sup>th</sup> Kentucky

Calvary C.S.A.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family.

I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer In Fayette County, Kentucky, born in the year 1840.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer I enlisted in February 1862 - with a Company <sup>under</sup> Capt. Jake Clay & Col. Thompson, and was transferred to Company A (Captain Tom McLean) 8<sup>th</sup> Ky. Cal. Regiment, Col. By Belknap, Genl John H. Morgan's Command.

How did you get out of the army, when and where? Was released as a prisoner and

Answer Was paroled at Lexington Ky. 1865.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Yes, Captured on Ohio Raid in July 1863, imprisoned in Camp Douglas, Chicago Ill for nineteen months.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Was paroled at Lexington Ky. 1865.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer Was captured at the Surrender of Lee's Army taken to Nashville then to Lexington, where I was paroled and released after taking the oath of allegiance.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer *Am in no business and do not earn anything*

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *Wife dead - and no estate*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *No Wife*

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer *Nothing*

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer *Yes*

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer *All my life*

Answer *No Yes*

*Gus Eastin says he was a member of Co. D. 2<sup>d</sup> Regiment, Morgan's Command. Knows that applicant was a member of Co. A. 8<sup>th</sup> Ky. Regiment, Morgan's Command. Knows that he was a prisoner of war at Camp Douglas, Ill. Knows that he was exchanged, knows that he served till the end of the war and that he was a faithful soldier.*

*Sam'l C. Bean says he was a member of Co. B. 8<sup>th</sup> Ky. Cavalry, S. S. A., that he knew Jas. Neal, who was also a member of same Co. Regiment. That they were prisoners of war at Camp Douglas, and bunk mates for 18 months or more, that they both were paroles for exchange, but the war ended before they were actually exchanged and that applicant was a faithful soldier.*

5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

B. Fuson, Judge Bell County Court, examined in open court the following applicant, and witnesses for said applicant:

Joseph F. Bosworth, being duly sworn, testifies he has known James Veal for 35 years; that he was a member of Morgan's command in service of Confederate Army; that he is a citizen of Kentucky and United States; that he absolutely no property or income; that he is physically incapable of earning a living by manual labor. Bosworth states he is a resident of Middlesboro, Ky.

Cal Miller, after being sworn states he is a citizen of Middlesboro, Ky., and is acquainted with James Veal; has known him for a number of years; that he has no property or income, and is physically incapable to earn a living by work.

After deducing above evidence, I, B. A. Fuson, Judge Bell County Court, do find that James Veal is a citizen of State of Kentucky; was in the service of Confederate Army; and under aforesaid act of Legislature, is entitled to a pension thereunder; and to this, I so certify.
