Mary E. Moore of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.)
Mary E. Moore, 605 North Second Street, Prington, Kenton County, Ky.
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State?
Since October 5th 1845
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name?
October 5, 1845, Boone County, Kentucky; Mary E. McHatten
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.)
1838, Boone Co. Gallatin, Boone, Kentucky. James Mitchell Moore. Married at Hamilton, Boone County, Kentucky, by Rev. Mitchell Black, of the Christian Church.
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States?

6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment?

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? Samuel Truman Moore
Nineteenth and Hill St. Covington, Kenton County, Kentucky
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Mary E. Moore? Yes
If so, how long have you known her? Fifty years
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Covington, Kenton County, Kentucky. All the time I have known her.
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? Yes
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? Yes
6. How long did you know him? All my life
7. When and where did James Mitchell Moore enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? Aug. or 1st of Sept. 1862

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent. Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.



Moore and Hugh McHattan are held and firmly bound to the Commonwealth of Kentucky, in the penal sum of one hundred dollars, for the payment whereof well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves our heirs, executors and administrators, jointly, severally and firmly by these presents; witness our signatures this 27 day of Dec'r 1865. The condition of the above obligation is such that whereas a marriage is shortly intended to be solemnized between the said J. M. Moore and Eliza McHatton now there if there be no lawful cause to obstruct said Marriage, then the above obligation to be void, else to be in full force.



The witness, Mary E. Moore, after being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

By Mr. Hanlon:

Q. What is your name?

A. Mary E. Moore.

Q. Where do you live?

A. I live at 605 22nd St.

Q. In Latonia?

A. No, on West 22nd Street.

Q. How long have you lived there?

A. About three years, at one place, I have lived in Covington 20 years.

Q. You are a widow?

A. Yes Sir.

A. James Mitchell Moore.

Q. When did he die?

A. Two years ago, last December.
