# Questions for Applicant

Mr. Lou Evans Rogan ..... of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) Mr. Lou Evans Rogan  
Georgetown Scott County, Kentucky
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? All my life
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? Was born March 25<sup>th</sup> 1849 in Fayette County Kentucky. My maiden name was Lou Evans
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) My husband's name was Warren T. Rogan and he was born in Bourbon County, Kentucky on December 3<sup>rd</sup> 1839. He and I were married in Hartsville County on March 3<sup>rd</sup> 1868 by Rev. R. J. Dillard, D.D. The marriage license is here annexed
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? He enlisted in Company A, 8<sup>th</sup> Ky. Cavalry Regiment at Boyle Station Fayette County in August or September 1862
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? Till July 1863 when my Company & Regiment were sent to Ohio on what was known as the Morgan Raid. He was captured at Buffington Island on July 19<sup>th</sup> 1863
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? In Ohio in July 1863 between July 19<sup>th</sup> & July 26<sup>th</sup> 1863. The whole regiment was captured at different dates between July 19<sup>th</sup> & July 26<sup>th</sup> 1863 and my husband was a senior soldier in Company A at the time of his capture together with a large part of the command at the same time
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? Answered above
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? He was present with his Company and regiment when captured
10. When and where did your husband die? At Midway, Kentucky on July 17<sup>th</sup> 1887
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? None

14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? Yes I have seven (7) children

15. Name some friend, giving his name and postoffice address, who will be willing to have us write to him about your case if necessary. Augustine J. Barker, Samuel C. Bean, J. D. Hunt of Lexington, Ky., Deplin E. Shatt of Covington, Ky.

# Questions for Witnesses

STATE OF KENTUCKY,

Samuel C. Bean..... of said State and County, having been presented as a witness in support of the application of Mrs. Lou Evans Rogan..... for a pension under Confederate Pension Law, approved March 11, 1912, after being duly sworn, true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? Samuel C. Bean, No. 407 West High Street, Lexington, Kentucky
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Lou Evans Rogan, Yes
- If so, how long have you known her? I have known her personally for only a short time.
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? I understand she lives in Georgetown, Scott County, Kentucky. I am informed and believe she was born in this State and has resided in this State all her life.
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? I was well acquainted with her husband Warren J. Rogan
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? No.
6. How long did you know him? I became acquainted with him about September, 1862.
7. When and where did Warren J. Rogan enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? I don't know the date and place. He was a member of Company A of 8th Kentucky Cavalry Regiment U.S.A. from its organization in September 1862 and I knew him well from that date till the end of the war, meeting him only occasionally through.
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? I was.
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? From the time of his enlistment to July 1863, when he went on what is called the Morgan Raid into Indiana and Ohio where the Regiment and he were captured and sent to prison. He and I was both prisoners of war most of the time at Camp Douglas Illinois till about March 1865.
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? His Company and Regiment was captured on Ohio between July 19th and July 26th 1863, and he was captured about the same time with the Command.
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? I had been left on the road to go further.
12. Was Warren J. Rogan the husband of applicant, present? I am satisfied that he was. I was left sick at Springfield, Kentucky, and being ordered to prison at Camp Douglas near Chicago Illinois met him with the other prisoners of my command who had been captured on the Morgan raid and remained there with him till about the last of February or early part of March 1865 when both he and I and a large part of our comrades were sent on Exchange to Richmond Virginia where we arrived early in March 1865 and were released under parole not to bear arms against the United States and we stayed in West Virginia in parole prison. I don't personally know whether and when Warren J. Rogan was in Virginia all the first summer of 1865 but I am satisfied he remained a parolee prisoner till the end. He was a faithful man and brave soldier.
13. If not present, where was he?
14. When and where did he leave his command? For what cause? By whose authority did he leave? How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.)
15. When and where did Warren J. Rogan die? I don't personally know.
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? I don't personally know his residence at his death. I am satisfied he was a resident of Kentucky all his life.
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of Warren J. Rogan? I only know by hearsay and general reputation; I am satisfied she was and is.

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? .....

*I believe she <sup>is his widow and unmarried</sup> ~~is~~ <sup>but only</sup> ~~knows~~ it by hearing and reputation.*

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge? .....

*I don't know.*

Has applicant conveyed any property, in the last two years or given any away, if so, what was it, and to whom? .....

*I don't know.*

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.  
Widow must have married prior to 1890.  
To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.  
Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.  
Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

The records show that one Warren Rogers, sergeant, Company A, 4th (subsequently called 8th) Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, enlisted September 10, 1862. On the muster roll dated February 13, 1863, only roll on file, he is reported present.

The prisoner of war records show that one Warren T. Rogers, private, Company A, 8th Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, was captured at Chester, Ohio, July 19, 1863; was paroled at Camp Douglas, Illinois, and transferred to Point Lookout, Md., for exchange February 24, 1865.

The records also show that one Warren J. Rogers, private, 8th Regiment Kentucky Cavalry (name not found on the rolls of the 8th Kentucky Cavalry) Confederate States Army, took the oath of allegiance at Chattanooga, Tennessee, May 2, 1865, he having deserted April 17, 1865.

The undersigned, Joseph D. Hunt, of Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky, makes this affidavit relating to the application of Mrs. Lou Evans Rogers, widow of the late Warren T. Rogers, for a pension under the recent laws of the State of Kentucky.

The affiant states that he has known Mrs. Lou Evans Rogers only for a short time; he does not remember having been acquainted with her prior to her marriage with Mr. Warren T. Rogers, and was not present at the marriage; he is satisfied that they were husband and wife in the manner stated in her own affidavit; he knew the father and family of Mrs. Lou Evans Rogers, and her father's name was Silas Evans, a member of quite a large family who lived for a long time in Fayette County, Kentucky, and he is satisfied that she was born and lived in said county all her life, *until her marriage, and ever since in the State of Kentucky*

The affiant was the Sergeant Major of the 8th Kentucky Cavalry Regiment C.S.A., the whole time of its service during the late war between the States; it came into service about September 1862, and, as a command, was captured in Ohio as one of the regiments composing the command of the late General John Hunt Morgan, between the 19th and 26th of July, 1863, and never after that served as an organized command in the Confederate Army; *as a command* they were all taken to prison, being in prison for a while *either* at Camp Morton at Indianapolis, *or* ~~and then~~ at Camp Chase near Columbus, Ohio, and afterwards transferred to Camp Douglas, Illinois, where substantially all of us, who did not die, or come home by taking the oath, remained until February or March,

1865. Both I and said Warren T. Rogers were among the persons that were in prison during that time. I became acquainted with Warren T. Rogers some time in September, 1862, when, as a member of "Company A", Captain T.W. McDann's Company, <sup>he</sup> joined the 8th Kentucky Cavalry, whose Colonel was Roy S. Cluke. Warren T. Rogers joined that Company and Regiment at or near the time of the organization, and remained a faithful, true and brave soldier in the Confederacy all through the war; and, while I do not remember seeing him at the time he was transferred to Richmond, Virginia, on exchange, in February or March, 1865, I am perfectly satisfied that he was there and was delivered from the United States authority as a paroled prisoner of war to the Confederate authorities at Richmond, Virginia, early in March, 1865. I do not remember having seen him after that during the war, but am sure he remained a paroled prisoner until the final surrender of the Confederate Army. If he deserted at any time, I certainly would have known it and would not have forgotten it. He was a well known soldier of the Regiment and served faithfully to the end. I know but little of his widow, do not know her condition or circumstances, but have no doubt that she states the facts, as presented in her affidavit, truly and faithfully. Her husband I knew intimately and well, and I know that he was a faithful, true and brave soldier.

I cannot answer in detail most of the questions that are propounded in the interrogatories, but I know the above facts to be true.
