## Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Ed Yeagle  
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Wilmore, R # 2  
Frog in the County of Woodford  
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between  
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of  
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear  
that I was a member of Company B, 8<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Kentucky Cavalry  
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-  
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Was born in Mercer County, Kentucky April 22<sup>nd</sup> 1844

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer In Sept 1862 in Co. 'B' Commanded by Captain Will Lewis in the 8<sup>th</sup> Ky Cavalry Commanded by Col Roy Heluke in Genl Geo. W. Morgan's Command. The S<sup>ts</sup> of the Co were Bush Castleman 1<sup>st</sup> Asa McCarthy 2<sup>nd</sup> Billy Smith 3<sup>rd</sup> Cicero Coleman was S<sup>t</sup> of the Regt and Robt Bullock Major.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Was captured near Buffington Island in Ohio in July 1863 in the "Ohio Raid" and imprisoned at Camp Douglas Chicago Ill. Was sent around from there to Richmond Va. for exchange at Abingdon Va. decided parole to come home to remain myself and was ended before left Ky to return to the Confederacy

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Was in Camp Chase Ohio for about one month and sent thence to Camp Douglas Ill. Was sent from there in July or March 1865 to Richmond Va. under parole for exchange.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Paroled by Federal at Camp Douglas Ill. in July or March 1865. Sent around for exchange. Was paroled by Confederates at Abingdon Va. to return to Ky for remnant about 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1865.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer After the surrender of Genl Lee in May 1865. At Lexington Ky as a returned Confederate Soldier

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer "Farm a little" + "Carpenter a little" Last year earned as a Carpenter about \$110 and had no other income

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer No real estate = a home 2 cows calves - a cow & four sheep all worth about \$300.

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer 40 acres of land = worth about \$1500.

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents, or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer \$110.#

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer No

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer All of my life I have been a citizen and resident of Kentucky. Several years prior to Jan 3<sup>rd</sup> 1910 I was employed in Missouri and was drafted by the U.S. Army and held incommunicado which time I held up Government when I ceased to work on that Jan 3<sup>rd</sup> 1910 I returned to my home and have remained here continuously since that date.

further make oath to the following facts touching the applicant's service in the Confederate army.

State here what witnesses know of their own knowledge,

Affiant knew the applicant well before the war. Affiant was a regularly enlisted member of Co. H. commanded by Capt. Gabe Alexander in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Regt of Ky Cavalry commanded by Col. Basil W. Duke and served with the company up to the capture of Morgan's men at Buffington Island in Ohio in July 1863. Affiant being captured in Ky at the beginning of the Ohio raid, and was imprisoned in Camp Douglas Ill. Affiant knows that the applicant was a member of Coluber's Regt - 8<sup>th</sup> Ky Cav - from the fall of 1862 - Genl. Bragg's movements Ky and was imprisoned with affiant in Camp Douglas Ill. after the capture of Morgan's men at Buffington Island in Ohio in 1863, and did not return to his home in Ky until after the war ended.

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filed out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

The Confederate records show that Ed. Yeagle, private, Company B, 8th Kentucky Cavalry (also called 4th Kentucky Cavalry), Confederate States Army, enlisted September 10, 1862. On the only company roll on file, dated February 12, 1863, he was reported present.

The Union records show that James E. Yeagle, private, same organization (name not found on rolls of the company), was captured July 20, 1863, at Cheshire, Ohio, and paroled February 13, 1865, at Camp Douglas, Illinois; that he was sent for exchange to Point Lookout, Maryland, and received February 20-21, 1865, at Boulwares and Cox's Wharf, James River. No later record of him has been found.
