Soldier's Application for Pension

I, William Green

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident of near Moore's Fork in the County of Trigg

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Arkansas, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of 5th Arkansas, Co. G

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born? I was born in Henry Co Tenn 1835

Answer I was born in Henry Co Tenn Aug 27 1835

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer I enlisted in the autumn of 1861 in the 9th Arkansas Reg
Co. C. My first Captain was Kelly, then Jovan who
was promoted Brigadier General, my first Captain
Prayon & Joz Leget, who was killed at Oliver Springs

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer I was a prisoner when the war ended at point
look out Maryland, and was wounded there

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer At Ft. Point look out Maryland (an Island) when
the war was over

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes in July 1865 at point look out Maryland

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

W. L. Green being sworn says, I live near Hattell, Tripp Co., Mo. I have lived there since 1867. I was a Confederate Soldier and enlisted in Sept 1861 and in service (and in prison together) until July 1865.

I have a ridge farm with small place with \$200— & my personal property worth \$200. I am not able to make a living by manual labor, I have no other means or property, no income.

I try to work, but can not do much. I was shot & my thigh broken in the battle of Franklin, Tenn., was in prison at Camp Chase & then at Point Look Out, Maryland. I am old & crippled & have no means and my wife has no means. I can not work much, no income.

Mrs. C. S. Hattell being sworn says I live near Cadiz, Mo. and I am a daughter of W. L. Green. I know he was in the Confederate Army. Know when mother rec'd a telegram when he was wanted & she received letters when he was in prison. He has a little farm & personal property. I have seen his parole & read it. We lost it when we moved.

I remember reading it to a lady friend,
He is crippled now from being shot &
wounded in the Confederate Service
not able to work much. Can not
make a living by manual labor
& has no income

Dear Sir :

Sometime ago I filed a claim for Confederate pension for William Green, who enlisted in the Confederate army in Company "C" but afterwards transferred to Company "H". Mr. Greene has been living in Kentucky for thirty odd years and has had no connection with his Arkansas friends who were his comrades in the Confederate army, and has had much trouble in establishing his right to a pension under the recent law passed by the last Kentucky Legislature. You will observe from his application that the weak point in his case, was establishing the fact that he had been honorably discharged from the Confederate army. In order to overcome that want of proof I wrote a letter to our representative and now senator-elect, Hon. Ollie M. James requesting the Adjutant General of the U.S. to examine in his office and ascertain what record was there touching the imprisonment and release of the applicant, William Green. I received by to-days mail a statement from the Adjutant General showing that the applicant was a prisoner of war and was released June the 6th 1865 at Point Lookout, Md., which I am inclosing to you to be filed and used as part of the testimony in his case. I trust that with this additional testimony that ^{now} with the testimony before them the Board will have no trouble in adjudging Mr. Green entitled to a pension.
