Soldier's Application for Pension

I, J. B. Wilson

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Owensboro in the County of Daviess

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of The 9th Regiment of Ky Vol Cav. Colonel

W. P. Breckinridge and of Co. C. Captain Lawrence Jones

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.
1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

The records show that one John B. Wilson, private and corporal, Company C, 9th Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, enlisted September 10, 1862, at Lexington, Kentucky, and that he surrendered May 9, 1865, at Augusta, Georgia, and took the oath of allegiance to the United States May 20, 1865, at Nashville, Tennessee, and was released.

The records also show that one Joseph B. Wilson, private, Company C, 9th Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, enlisted September 10, 1862. The company muster roll for January and February, 1864 (last on which borne) shows him "Deserted December 28, 1863, near Charleston, Tennessee." The prisoner of war records show him captured November 25, 1863, at Cleveland, Tennessee, and released upon oath and bond January 17, 1864, at Louisville, Kentucky, with the remark "Deserter from the Rebel Army." A later record shows him surrendered at Augusta, Georgia, May 1, 1865, and released upon taking the oath of allegiance to the United States May 21, 1865, at Nashville, Tennessee.

Application for Pension, No, 476:-

This cause coming on to be heard before, Hon, W.W. Owen, Judge of the Daviess County Court and C.M. Finn Attorney for said County being present, the claimant J.R. (Joseph R.) Wilson being sworn stated as follows in relation to said case as follows Viz:-

I was born in Johnson County Missouri and brought to Kentucky by my Parents when a child, about 3 years old, so I have been told by my Parents, I was born March 11, 1840 and am now past 70 years of age.

I enlisted in Company C, 9th - Regiment Ky, Vol, Cav at Lexington Ky, Morgans Cavalry, Colonel W.C.P. Breckenridge was Colonel of my Regiment, the 9th Ky Cav, and Captain Lawrence Jones was Captain of my Company, Co, C.

I was in active service until on or about the _____ day of 1863 or 1864 my best impression was that it was in 1864, thought I may not be correct in that.

I was taken prisoner, I was sick at the time had been in bad health for some time, I was taken to prison at Louisville Ky, where I remained until about _____ 1864 my Father-, who resided at Covington Ky-, came after me, came for the purpose of securing my release because of my being sick, I was very sick:

My Father succeeded in obtaining my release just how I do not know, he managed all the details, I was too sick to take much interest in it, I was released, I dont know what papers he my Father got if any, I was released and went home with him and was very sick and under a Doctor for quite a while, I did not go back to the service, I was not able to do so any more.

I have no property I stay with my Daughter Mrs, W.L. Stephens in Owensboro Ky. I have no property of any kind real personal or mixed, I have in Bank \$75.00 this is every cent I have in the world,, I have got no contract or agreement with any one to support me or to take care of me, I am not able to work at all, I am almost blind and physical physically unable to do any work of any kind or attend to business I have resided in Kentucky all my life-"Except as I was told I was born in Missouri and brought to Ky when 3 years old, since I have lived in Ky,

Mrs *Maggie* Stephens, stated she had known claimant all her life, that he owned no property of any kind and was unable to earn any part of his own support, that he was a resident of Kentucky for many years, that his wife is living, that he has no income from any source whatever, and that he is the same and identical J.R. (Joseph R.) Wilson who served in the Confederate Army in Co, C, 9th Ky, Cav, in the war between the States 1861 to 1865.

This case having been heard and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that the applicant J.R. Wilson-(Joseph R. Wilson) was in the Confederate service and that he served for more than one year and that he was a prisoner and released while sick and in feeble health in 1864, and that he is indigent as contemplated

by the Act of the General Assembly of Kentucky Approved March 11th
1912, I therefore recommend that he be granted a pension under the
said act.
