

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, W. H. White

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Mottle in the County of Warren

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Tennessee, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Co. "K" 2nd and 1st Regt. Tennessee Vol. Cav.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Macon Co. Tenn.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer In the year 1861. I do not remember date of enlistment.
General Bedford Forrest. Captain Buck Moore.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Paroled at Gainesville Ala. on May 10th. 1865.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Was never in prison.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer On May 10th. 1865, at Gainesville, Ala.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer If I did I do not remember any thing about it.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer If I did at all, it was when I was paroled.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer. I am trying to farm what I can. I do not earn any thing much.

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer. I do not own any property of any kind whatever either real, personal or mixed, except a few common household goods and furniture, worth about \$50.00.

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer. She does not own any property of any kind whatever either real, personal or mixed, except what interest she may own in the above.

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer. Have received no money from wages, nor from rents, nor from money loaned. I have made nothing and my wife has made nothing during the past year, except what little I tried to make on a small rented farm.

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer. I do not.

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer. Thirty years. I came to the State of Kentucky in 1882.

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer. I have.

If so, give his name and address?

Answer. J. M. Simmons of Bowling Green, Warren Co. Ky.

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.







Private, W. H. White, Regiment Tennessee Cavalry of Company "K"

U. S. A., residing in Macon County Tennessee having been, with the approval of the proper authorities, paroled, is permitted to return to his home, not to be disturbed by the United States authorities so long as he observes his parole and the laws in force where he may reside.

He is unable to do any work or enough to earn a support on account of his physical condition. Among other things, he is short-winded. The applicant is a good citizen.

I recommend that he be granted a pension.
