I, John Ellison Myron

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Princeton in the County of Boyd

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Tennessee, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company F. 11th Tennessee Infantry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Trigg County, Ky. in year 1841.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer May 1st 1861. 1st Jim Long, Capt. Jim Pange, Col. - Gorman, 2nd Jim. Col. Merri Myron, 2nd Jim. Sam Allen, 3rd Jim.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Captured at Sava, Alabama. June of 1864.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Yes. Chatham, Tenn. Nashville, Tenn. Lawrence, Ky. Released in Spring 1865.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes. Released as a prisoner of war.





To Applicants for Pension

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Your letter of July 15th was promptly received here and a voucher was mailed to you, and also a check was mailed to you at the address given in that letter, and you were informed that the law provided that when a pensioner moved out of this State, or was absent therefrom for a period of three months, his name would be dropped from the pension roll. I have yours of the 8th inst., and as I have heretofore written you, the Kentucky Confederate pension law provides that when a pensioner removes from this State or is absent therefrom for a period of three months, the name shall be dropped from the pension roll, and your letter of July 15th, 1918, states that you have moved to Algoa, Ark. to live, from which you will see that I have no option in the matter, and had to drop your name from the pension roll.
