1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.)

2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? *all my life*

3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? *Mary Louisa Ray

4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.)

5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? *May 1861 Nashville Tennessee 11th Tenn Infy*

6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? *until captured at Atlanta Ga. Sept. 64*

7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? *was captured at Atlanta Ga. carried to Camp Douglas, Ill. released March 1865*

8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? *was in prison*

9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? *he was in prison at Camp Douglas, Ill.*

10. When and where did your husband die? *Franklin, Simpson County Ky June 8, 1880*

11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? *yes*

12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? *no*

13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value?

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? *Charles L. Daugherty*

2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. *Mary Louisa Daugherty*?
If so, how long have you known her? *More than thirty years*
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? *At Auburn Ky since I have known her*
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? *Yes*
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? *I was not*
6. How long did you know him? *All my life he was my brother*
7. When and where did *George R. Daugherty* enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? *May 1861 Nashville Tenn Co - Cavalry 1st Inf. I was a young brother living near Nashville Tenn*
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? *No*
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? *Captured at Atlanta Ga in Sept 1864 was in prison at close of war at Camp Douglas*
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? *Don't know*
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? *No. I belonged to the 9th Tenn Cavalry (Morgan's Command)*
12. Was *Geo. R. Daugherty*, the husband of applicant, present?
13. If not present, where was he? *at Camp Douglas. I read letters from him to our Mother written from Camp Douglas during the war*
14. When and where did he leave his command?
For what cause?
By whose authority did he leave?
- How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) *I know by letters from him to my self while I was a prisoner at Camp Chase Ohio and letters read by me after the war to our Mother written while he was at Camp Douglas*
15. When and where did *Geo. R. Daugherty* die?

16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? *Dead a number of years resident of State for more than thirty years*
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of *Geo. R. Daugherty*?

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge?

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.






I, J. W. Edwards, Judge of the Logan County Court, do hereby certify, as such Judge, that I heard, in open court, the statements of Rhea G. Price and Joe S. Ray as to the citizenship, residence and means of support of the applicant,

Mrs. Mary Louisa Daughtry and that the said witness Rhea Price has his postoffice at Auburn, Ky; and that the said witness Joe S. Ray has his postoffice at Auburn, Ky; and that both of said witnesses were duly sworn; and that the above constitutes the substance of the testimony of each of said witnesses. And I further certify that from the evidence I find that said Mrs. M. L. Daughtry is a citizen and resident of Kentucky, Logan County; and that he has been such continuously since the first day of January 1907; and that he is an indigent and disabled person within the meaning of the act of the Legislature governing this proceedings; and that he has no property in excess of the sum of \$100 and no means of support. And I further recommend that under said evidence, and under the recent act of the Legislature applicable thereto, that said applicant be granted a pension

Referring to your letter of yesterday, received today, in which you request to be informed whether the name of Robt. Daughtry appears on the muster rolls of the 11th Tennessee Infantry, Confederate States Army, I am directed by the Secretary of War to inform you that the name Robert Daughtry has not been found on the rolls of said organization on file in this Department.

The records show, however, that one George R. Daughtry served as a private in Company G of that regiment. He enlisted May 10, 1861, at Nashville, Tennessee, for the term of one year. He was captured September 3, 1864, at Atlanta, Georgia, and was released March 9, 1865, at Camp Douglas, Illinois, upon taking the oath of allegiance to the United States.
