the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Company "G" Twelfth Tennessee Cavalry
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In the matter of application for pension of William Thomas Thornbrough, whose post office address is Wingo, Graves County, Kentucky, R. F. D. No. 1, the court makes the following report of findings, viz: That the applicant has been a resident of Kentucky more than 40 years; that he owns property amounting to \$500.; that he has not a sufficient income for his support; that his wife has no property or income; that on account of his advanced age and infirmitied he is not able to earn his support; and that he does not now and has never received a pension from the United States Government or any State or Foreign Government. Then came A. Vaden and H. Ramsey, witnesses herein, whose Post office' address' is Wingo, Kentucky, who after having been duly sworn testified as follows; that they have known the applicant 50 years; that he owns property to the amount of \$150.; that he has no income of their knowledge; and that he is not physically able to earn his support.

Wherefore in view of the foregoing facts it is the judgment of the Court that said applicant should be granted a pension and the Court so recommends.
