Soldier's Application for Pension

I, T. M. White,

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Louisville in the County of Jefferson,
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Tennessee, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Co G, 2nd Tennessee Cavalry, C. S. of A

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family.
I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:



1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filed out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Union Prisoner of War records show that he was captured at Big Hill, Ky., July 30, 1863 and paroled at Ft. Delaware, Del., and forwarded to City Point, Va., for exchange Feb. 27, 1865; also that he was captured at Carter's Station, Tenn., March 26, 1865, and released at Camp Chase, Ohio, on Oath of Allegiance, May 11, 1865.*

To Whom It May Concern:

This is to certify, that I, Charles Coffin, was acquainted, in my boyhood, with T. Matt White, of Madisonville, Monroe County, Tennessee; that at the commencement of the war between the States, he enlisted in a Cavalry Company, raised by Capt. John A. Rowen, of Monroe County; that at the reorganization in May 1862, that company became "Co. G." of the Second Tennessee Cavalry, C.S.A., commanded by Col. Henry M. Ashby. I was appointed Serg't Major of that Regiment. In July 1863, on a raid into Kentucky, under Col. John S. Scott of the First Louisiana Cavalry, C.S.A., T. Matt White and I were captured and taken first to Camp Chase, near Columbus, Ohio, and afterwards to Fort Delaware. I left Fort Delaware October 31st, 1864, and was exchanged at Savannah Ga., November 12, 1864. I left T. Matt White, with several others of that Regiment, at Fort Delaware. A number of them, including, as I have been informed, T. Matt White, were exchanged, at City Point, Va., in March 1865, and furloughed, and the surrender coming so soon thereafter, numbers of them never got back to their commands.

The Second Tennessee Cavalry, was, at that time in Wheelers Cavalry Corps, in front of Sherman's Army, in North Carolina.

T. Matt White was a Sergeant in Co. G., at the time of his capture, and was always a good, brave and faithful Confederate Soldier, and I believe he was such to the end.

was a member of a Company of Cavalry made up
by Capt John A Nowan and mustered in to the
service of the Confederate States at Sweet water
Monroe Louisiana on the 28th day of June 1861, and
I Matt. White was a member of same Company
and mustered in the Company on day and date
above mentioned, After being in the service some time
with other Companies was organized in to a Battalion Ben
Brenner was Lieut-Col Commanding, Afterwards we
was at the Reorganization in May 1862 in ~~the~~ other Co's
organized in to a Regiment with H. M. Ashby as Col
our letter being Co G, that in July 1863 we was on a
raid in Ky Commanded by Col John Scott of the First
Louisiana Regiment. I Matt White and myself
with others was taken prisoners and sent to Camp Chase
near Columbus Ohio after a stay of 8 months we was sent
to Fort Delaware on an Island in the Delaware Bay where
we was segregated and sent to Richmond Va in March
1865 but was never declared exchanged among at our
release in May 1865.

-JEFFERSON COUNTY COURT-

At the Court held on the 18th day of January, 1917,
IN RE Application of T. M. White, of Co. G. 2nd Tenn.
Cav., for Confederate Pension.

This matter coming on to be heard and the Court hearing testimony in open Court; the County Attorney being present, a brief substance of the testimony of each witness is as follows.

APPLICANT: T. M. White, 508 S. Sixth St., Louisville, Ky.
WITNESS : David Hirsch, 1485 S. Fourth, Louisville, Ky.
" : E. P. Head, 741 S. 22nd St., Louisville, Ky.

testified that the applicant was a Confederate Soldier; that he has resided in this State continuously since January 1, 1907; that they have known his personally for several years; that he is unable to earn his living by manual labor, and is not able to earn a living by reason of any knowledge, art or skill in any profession, trade or craft. He does not receive a pension from the United States or any foreign government; that he does not possess a net income of \$300.00 per year; that he has no property to the amount of \$2500.00; that he has no contract or agreement with any one for his support, nor is he able by reason of the combined partial ability to earn a support.

I therefore find that the applicant has been a resident and citizen continuously since January 1, 1907 of Jefferson County and the State of Kentucky, and he has no means of support of any kind, and that the Doctor and two lay witnesses to application and witnesses heard are reputable witnesses entitled to credit.

I recommend that the application for pension be granted.
