in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of ... Missouri, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Co. "B" 3rd Mo. Cavalry. Capt. Dewitt Stone - Col. Owen for 6 months from

May 61 to Nov 61. Nov 61 - enlisted for 3 yrs. Co. "B" 3rd Mo. Cav. under Col. Joe Shelby...

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-

ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer ... Logan County, Kentucky, July 4th 1840

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer Company "B" 3rd Mo. Cavalry; - Capt. Dewitt Stone; Colonel - Owen for 6 months May 1861 to Nov 1861 - Enlisted for 3 years and during war in Nov. 1861 served in Co. "B" 3rd Mo. Cavalry under Capt. Sprangler; Colonel Joe Shelby in Marmaduke's Division

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer when I got part of my pay captured at Shreveport La. got out at St Louis Mo May 20, 1865

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer no yes, in St Louis Mo - May 20, 1865

The records show that one R. C. Barker, private, Company E, 6th (also known as 3d) Missouri Cavalry, C.S.A. (Shelby's Brigade), enlisted September 13, 1862, in Newton County, Missouri. The master roll for January and February, 1864, last on file, shows him present.

The records also show that one R. C. Barker, private, Company I, 9th Regiment Missouri Infantry, C. S. A., was surrendered at New Orleans, Louisiana, May 26, 1865, and paroled at Alexandria, Louisiana, June 7, 1865.

Nothing additional has been found of record relative to the subject of the inquiry.

JUDGMENT.

Application for Pension

The application in the above styled cause having been filed at the ~~May~~ 1912 term of the Union County Court and caused to lie over until the ~~June~~ term, 1912 of said Court for trial as to applicant's residence, citizenship and means of support, the County attorney being present to represent the Commonwealth, the following testimony was introduced in addition to testimony of subscribing witnesses to applicant's application:-

R. C. Barker:- That he had been a resident of the state of Kentucky continuously since 1865, that all the property he owns is a house and lot in Sturgis, Union county, Ky worth about \$450.00, that he is unable to earn a support for himself and wife or even self by manual labor, that his wife owned no property at all, and that the both of them do not earn as much as \$200.00 per year, that he is dependent upon his son for a support.

G. H. Whitecotton:- That he had known the applicant for more than fifteen years and that during all of that time he had resided at Sturgis, Union county, Kentucky and no where else, that applicant was so feeble on account of advanced and other infirmities that he was unable to perform manual labor, that he had no trade or calling of any kind and that he received no income from any other source, that he was dependent upon his son for support, that wife's applicant did not earn and support nor did she own any property whatever, and that applicant owned his home in Sturgis, KY. worth about \$500.00, whereupon G. T. Berry County Attorney waived the introduction of any further testimony.

Wherefore the Court being sufficiently advised, finds and adjudges that the applicant, R. C. Barker is a citizen of Union county and the state of -Kentucky, and that his post office address is Sturgis, Kentucky, that he has been a citizen of the state of Kentucky since before the 8st day of January, 1907, that he does not own property of the value of as much as \$2500.00, that he is unable to earn a support for himself by manual labor, that he has no trade, calling or profession by which he can earn a support and that his wife owns no property at all.

Then came the said A. N. Barker who was duly qualified according to law.


