Soldier's Application for Pension

I, M. B. Mason

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Lysmith in the County of Grant

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Tennessee, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company "19" 5th Tennessee Regiment
Infantry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.

Enlisted Aug. 10th, 1861, in Co. K, 5th Tennessee Inf'y. and there is record proof of service to Jan. 1863. Affidavits filed with his application show him wounded at Murfreesboro in Jan. 1863, supposedly so severe that he would not be able to render further military service, but being severely wounded and left on the field he was erroneously reported deserted, but the proof shows, which was filed with the application Oct. 5, 1922, that ~~in the fall of 1864~~ when he had partially recovered he returned to the service in another command and served as a soldier in light duty till the fall of 1864, when he was again captured and placed in prison at Paducah, Ky. where he remained some months and escaped from prison early in the spring of 1865, and after his escape he was returning in an effort to get to the last command in which he had served and met the Confederate soldiers

In the matter of application for pension of M. B. Mooney, whose post office address is Lynville, Graves County, Kentucky, the Court makes the following report of findings, viz:

That the applicant has been a resident of Kentucky 60 years; that he has no property of any kind; that he has not disposed of any property; that he has no income and he is not able to earn his support on account of advanced age and infirmities; and that he does not now and has never received a pension from the United States Government or any state or foreign Government.

Then came W. A. McCuan, whose post office address is Lynville, Ky., and J. M. Wheeler whose post office address is Sedalia,

Ky., witnesses herein, who after having been duly sworn testified as follows: That they have known the applicant 50 years and that he has been a resident of Kentucky all of said time; that he owns no property of any kind to their knowledge; that he has no income, and that he is not able to earn his support on account of infirmities and advanced age.

Wherefore in view of the foregoing facts it is the judgment of the court that said applicant should be granted a pension and the court so recommends.

I am in receipt of yours of the 29th inst. relative to the application for pension of Mr. M. B. Mooney. His application is on file here but has not been reached for consideration by the Pension Board, but I have examined the proof filed with his application and find the war records give his record as follows:

"The records show that M. B. Mooney, private, (2nd) Company D, (also known as 1st Company K), 5th Regiment Tennessee Infantry, Confederate States Army, enlisted August 10, 1861 (also shown as July 1 -). On the company roll dated January 19, 1864, last on which his name is borne, he was reported "Deserted at Shelbyville, Tennessee, January, 1863." No later record of him has been found."

Unless the applicant can show that this is a mistake in the records, and that he was honorably discharged from the service, the Pension Board could not allow him a pension under the law.




