GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION

SPECIAL SESSION

LEGISLATURE.

"PROCLAMATION".

"TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
 "THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

WHEREAS, it is apparent that the income of the State has been very materially reduced on account of the decreased valuation of all kinds of property for taxation purposes by the State, and that a further reduction in the State's already depleted revenues was occasioned by virtue of the passage by the last Regular Session of the General Assembly of Kentucky of laws reducing the cost of automobile and truck license plates, and because of the reduction in the tax rate upon all real estate within the Commonwealth from thirty cents to five cents upon the valuation fixed thereon for State taxation purposes; and,

WHEREAS, by virtue of the present financial condition of the country as a whole and under the revenue laws now in force in this State, the income of the State, for the support of its general government and to meet the needs of government, has been reduced within the last two years from more than \$20,000,000 to less than \$10,000,000; and, therefore, the income of the State will be utterly inadequate to efficiently maintain the various departments of the State Government and adequately support the schools of the State commensurate with their needs; and,

WHEREAS, the government of the United States, through its Congress, has passed laws providing funds to assist the States of the Nation in relieving the distress of their citizens, caused by unemployment, provided the States match the money so provided, as required by federal authorities; and,

WHEREAS, certain domestic life insurance companies, under present laws, are denied the privilege of borrowing money from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for the reason that said companies are not authorized to issue unassessable stock that can be placed as collateral to secure loans from the Federal Government; and,

MONDAY MAY 7, 1934.

WHEREAS, by reason of the reduction of tax upon real estate, herein mentioned, many of the sheriffs of the State, elected in Counties thereof, will have the emoluments of their offices materially reduced, and to such extent that their income will be insufficient to justify them in discharging the duties of such offices in the Counties thus affected. These officials should, by virtue of the provisions of an enabling act, be relieved from the conditions described; and,

WHEREAS, the regular 1934 session of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky concluded its labors and adjourned without having enacted an appropriation act, or without having made any appropriation for the support of the general State Government or any of its departments or divisions, and so adjourned without providing any additional revenue to meet the needs of the State Government, notwithstanding that its depleted condition at the time was well known, and failed to enact any revenue measures whatsoever in lieu of the revenues lost to the State by virtue of certain laws passed by that session; and,

WHEREAS, certain laws, that were enacted at the session referred to, were defective on account of irregularities occurring in the enrolled bill that would have destroyed their effectiveness. These laws should be re-enacted, repealed or amended at the ensuing special session:

THEREFORE, in consideration of the facts and conditions mentioned, and in accordance with the power vested in me by the Constitution of the State to convene the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in extraordinary session, I, as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, do issue this, my proclamation, convening the General Assembly of Kentucky in extraordinary session at the seat of Government at Frankfort, Kentucky at twelve o'clock noon, on Wednesday, the ninth day of May, 1934, for the sole purpose of considering the following subjects:

1. To enact such measures as will provide sufficient revenue to carry on all proper functions of the State Government, including common schools and higher institutions of learning, and to provide necessary funds for relief of the unemployed and distressed of the State; and to repeal any laws in conflict with such measures.
2. To appropriate necessary sums to the various State Departments, commissions and agencies to carry on their respective duties and functions.
3. To amend and re-enact or correct Senate Bill No. 330, 1934 General Assembly.
4. To amend and re-enact a bill introduced at the 1934 session of the General Assembly, being House Bill No. 360, relating to the consolidation of the offices of jailers and sheriffs.
5. To enact a measure authorizing domestic life insurance companies to issue non-assessable stock.
6. To amend, re-enact or repeal House Bill No. 781, known as the Nudist Bill.
7. To enact a measure compensating the sheriffs of the State in sums not exceeding the amount lost to them in commissions at four per cent by reason of the reduction of the real estate tax from thirty cents to five cents for State purposes.
8. To enact laws relating to chattel mortgages.
9. To enact a measure relating to the acceptance by the State of the William Lindsay property, devised to it by Eleanor Holmes Lindsay.
10. To amend and re-enact House Bill No. 477, relating to a refund of auto truck license fees.

You will, therefore, in accordance with this proclamation, assemble in said extra-

ordinary session at the seat of government at Frankfort, Kentucky, on the day and date above written, to consider the subjects herein mentioned, and only said subjects.

Given under my hand, this the seventh day of May, 1934, and in the one hundred and forty-second year of the Commonwealth.
