P R O C L A M A T I O N

The Governor this day issued the following proclamation:

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

WHEREAS, the week of April 25 to May 2, 1942, has been selected as "Boys

and Girls Week" throughout the United States in order to focus attention upon boys and girls, their potentialities, and their problems; and

WHEREAS, the objects of this week are to awaken an increasing number of adults to the joys and opportunities of helping youth; to give impetus to year-round programs and character building activities for the general welfare of boys and girls by acquainting the public with the agencies which are serving this purpose; to emphasize the importance of the complete development of boys and girls, physically, mentally, and spiritually, calling attention to the functions of the home, the school, and the church in this development; to instill in boys and girls love of country, respect for law and established institutions, and a realization of the benefits and responsibilities of citizenship; and

WHEREAS, boys and girls who are healthy, self-reliant, well trained and loyal are vital to the security of our country; and

WHEREAS, because victory for the democracies in the present international conflict involves not only better armies and navies, but better boys and girls as well, we believe it would be neither safe nor consistent with our humanitarian principles and the educational policies of our Commonwealth to neglect to build better character and citizenship among our boys and girls while giving so much thought and energy to material defense;

NOW, THEREFORE, as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, I do hereby proclaim the week beginning April 25th and ending May 2nd, 1942, as "BOYS AND GIRLS WEEK" in this State, and I do call upon the business men, civic organizations, churches, schools, and citizens at large to cooperate with their local Boys and Girls Week committees in carrying on this worthy program.

Done at Frankfort, Kentucky, this the nineteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty-two and in the year of the Commonwealth the one hundred fiftieth.

WHEREAS, the younger workers who are now employed in industry will be required for the armed forces,

NOW, THEREFORE, as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, I do hereby proclaim the week beginning May 3 as

NATIONAL EMPLOYMENT WEEK

and urge all employers, citizens, civic and other organizations to make a special effort to have everyone register with the United States Employment Office who is possessed of skilled qualifications or who desires training for skilled or semi-skilled jobs in war industries.

TRANSFER OF FUNDS

The Governor this day issued the following Executive Order:

WHEREAS, the 1940 General Assembly made an emergency relief appropriation for the relief of indigent persons in the Commonwealth, not otherwise provided for in any other agency, and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Kentucky, through the Department of Welfare, sponsors a project for the distribution of Federal Purchased Surplus Commodities to the needy people of the State, and

WHEREAS, funds available for the administrative costs are now practically exhausted and it is imperative that this phase of public assistance be continued through the Department of Welfare, Division of Surplus Commodity Distribution, for the remainder of the fiscal year, an emergency is declared to exist,

THEREFORE, I, Keen Johnson, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and by virtue of the authority vested in me as such by this Executive Order hereby order and direct the Commissioner of Finance and the State Treasurer to set up out of the Emergency Relief Fund, provided for in Chapter 16, Part One-A, Section 16, subsection (e), Acts of 1940 General Assembly, the sum of \$25,000.00 to be transferred from said Emergency Relief Fund to the Department of Welfare, Public Assistance, U. S. Commodity Distribution, and is to be expended in accordance with the allotments that may be made by the Commissioner of Finance and in accordance with the laws governing disbursements, and any balance in the account at the end of the fiscal year shall revert to the Emergency Relief Fund.
